A BILL TO REGULATE GOVERNMENT OUTSOURCING TO PRIVATE CONTRACTORS

BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. SECTION 1. The Department of Justice shall be forbidden to outsource
2. courtroom security or prison management to private contractors.
3. SECTION 2. Unless a federal state of emergency is declared, all federal contracts
4. shall be awarded through an open-bidding system
5. SECTION 3. All federal contracts must come directly under the supervision of
6. their employing federal government agency; a private entity shall not be hired to
7. oversee federal contracts.
8. SECTION 4. Federal contractors must first seek the approval of their supervising
9. agencies before hiring sub-contractors.
10. SECTION 5. Federal contractors must provide data to their supervising agencies
11. that indicate their own expenses and cost estimates as well as those of any hired
12. sub-contractors.
13. SECTION 6. All unclassified and declassified federal contract spending data
14. shall be made public on <http://www.USASpending.gov>
15. SECTION 7. The above provisions will take effect in the 2013 Fiscal Year.
16. SECTION 8. All laws in noncompliance shall be declared null and void.

A Bill to Implement Tax Reform

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

1. Section 1. All exemptions, deductions, credits, shelters, and “loopholes” are
2. hereby eliminated from the Internal Revenue Code of the United States excluding
3. those for state and local taxes.
4. Section 2. Income rates for individual are as follows
5. 1% for taxable income between \$1 and \$25,000.
6. 12% for taxable income between \$25,001, and \$75,000
7. 19% for taxable income between \$75,001 and \$250,000
8. 28% for taxable income above \$250,000 with a 2% millionaire’s tax
9. AMT shall be abolished.
10. For families (joint filers) the brackets have twice the dollar amount for income
11. under \$250,000.
12. All dollar amounts are indexed for inflation
13. Section 3. Capital Gains shall be taxed as part of ordinary income.
14. SECTION 4. The Corporate Tax Rate shall be taxed at 10% for profit under
15. \$100,000 and 25% for profit above \$100,001. Non-Profit Organizations are
16. untaxed.
17. SECTION 5. This law will take effect for Fiscal Year 2013 being enforced by
18. the IRS.
19. Section 6. All laws in conflict with this legislation are hereby declared null
20. and void.

A BILL TO END AGRICULTURAL SUBSIDIES

1 BE IT ENACTED BY THE STUDENT CONGRESS HERE ASSEMBLED THAT:

2 Section 1: All agricultural subsidies shall be phased out over the next five years.

3 Section 2: Funds for agricultural subsidies shall be reallocated to domestic and
4 international food assistance programs, with the goal of fighting hunger.

5 Section 3: A) Agricultural subsidies are defined as direct payments to farmers to
6 support their production of agricultural goods.

7 B) Food assistance is defined as prevention of hunger through assistance
8 to underprivileged individuals who have difficulty affording food.

9 Section 4: Punitive tariffs shall be levied against countries who continue their
10 agricultural subsidies programs five years after the passage of this
11 legislation, with the president setting said tariffs with the goal of
12 pressuring said nations to abandon their subsidies programs.

13 Section 5: The Departments of the Treasury, the Department of Agriculture, and
14 the Agency for International Development (USAID) shall enforce and
15 monitor this legislation, as well as distribute funds.

16 Section 6: This bill shall take effect immediately upon passage.

17 Section 7: All laws or portions of laws conflicting with the provisions of this
18 legislation shall hereby be declared null and void.
